
# Journeys of Transformation Book Signing

Kerem Shalom will host a book signing event recognizing the recent publication of Journeys of Transformation: Confronting the Legacies of Conflict, War, and Genocide, authored by Wilma Busse, EdD; Martina Emme, PhD; and Kerem Shalom Cantor Rosalie Gerut, MA.

The program will include readings from the book, film clips, and a moderated discussion with Rosalie, Wilma, and Martina, along with an introduction by Rabbi Darby. KS members will perform Klezmer music, and light refreshments will be offered.

Journeys of Transformation includes stories. music, films and art of individuals whose lives have been impacted by the Shoah (Holocaust), either as victims or as members/bystanders of the Nazi regime. The book represents the work of the non-profit organization, One-by-One-International. Using the Dialogue Group process, One-by-One facilitates group discussions that enable understanding, compassion, and a path forward for people with a legacy on both sides of conflict and genocide. The impact of these dialogue groups has been life-affirming for many participants who have suffered from the aftermath of World War II and the Shoah. It has also touched people from other parts of the world.

The experiences and narratives in the book present an important message and healing process for the world in conflict today, and provide "a glimpse of what the world can be: one in which people from opposing sides of conflict, war, and genocide come together to listen, understand, and help one another transform painful histories into hopeful futures." (Introduction p. 1).

Journeys of Transformation books will be available for sale, and the authors will be available to sign them.

# Annual Holocaust Remembrance Concord-Carlisle Human Rights Council With Werner Salinger

The Concord-Carlisle Human Rights Council will present its annual Town Hall Yom Ha-Shoah event, featuring speaker Werner Salinger, Mr. Salinger was born in 1932 in Berlin, Germany to Jewish parents who fled with him to the U.S when he was 7 years old. Following WWII, Werner joined the U.S. forces which were then operating in post-war Germany, using his language fluency to collect intelligence. He will speak about his experiences during and after the war. Rosalie Gerut, Kerem Shalom cantor, will chant a prayer.

#### The Final Agony

Werner Salinger, April 2014

Spewed unto the streets like waste from a boiling cauldron, the final solution to the final solution, they shuffle through the endless German countryside, not aware of church spires to their right or left in quiet German towns that never heard their screams in all those years of horror, nor now.

They are the remnants of the camps whose names are worth recalling - Auschwitz and Theresienstadt, Birkenau and Sobibor - and others too numerous to tally; too numerous as well, the millions whose last gasps mirrored the flames awaiting them - or, perhaps with greater mercy, the belching gun.

Their fate determined on Alpine slopes, in an earlier time, by human thought so depraved all attempt at reconstruction fails, they stumble now in sunlight and in darkness, as winter dampness clings to branches stubbornly refusing to welcome spring's promises of warmth and color, past other humans unwilling to see or hear them.

Comprehending neither past nor future, their forward motion more robotic than chosen, they think of their expulsion from the camp - if they can think at all - as a body that, in death, expels its waste one final time. The final agony. Not all will reach the destination of which not even the herders of the skeletal configuration are aware; I must move on, that much I know,

For any failed step will be my last. I must move on and live to tell the world of these obscenities whose origins are traceable to Alpine mountainsides where reason turned to madness but no one wept. Perhaps they'll weep today

# From Kerem Shalom Bar Mitzvah to the State House Looking to the Future


**LED\* Series with Simon Cataldo**

Representatives in 2022. In his wide-ranging talk, Simon will be focusing on how Judaism and Tikkum Olam can inform service in elected office.



Simon brings an unusual combination of personal qualities to his work on Beacon Hill and in his district. He is passionate about what he does, innovative about how he approaches issues, hard-working and collaborative. The issues facing the state as a whole and the communities he represents—Carlisle, and parts of Concord, Acton, and Chelmsford—are challenging, to say the least. Simon has taken on tough issues, including plans for the homeless, education, climate and the environment, housing, integrity in government, and health care—as well as issues that specifically affect his communities in a major way, such as what to do with the Concord prison property and reconfiguring the Route 2 rotary.

Join us to hear an inspiring and informative talk from a state rep who grew up in his district and knows it and its people well. Simon and his family are members of Kerem Shalom and he serves on the Jewish Community Relations Council of Greater Boston.



She will discuss the inspiration behind her novel, *Trowbridge Road* (Candlewick Press, 2020), which was a Junior Library Guild Gold Standard Selection, a finalist for the Massachusetts Book Award, the Golden Dome Award and one of ten YA titles longlisted for a



National Book Award in 2020. Marcella will also read sneak previews from her forthcoming novel-in-verse, *Neshama* (Candlewick Press, 2025). This is a Jewish ghost story about intergenerational trauma, bravery and forgiveness.

#### Classes in Judaic Studies

The Newest Forms of the Oldest Hatred: Understanding Contemporary Antisemitism

With Dr. Jacob Meskin

**Dates: Tuesday evenings** 

May 7, 14, 21, 28, and June 4

Time: 7 – 8:30pm Location: Zoom

Cost: Free for KS members, \$100 for non-members

A number of dangerous forms of antisemitism are poisoning our contemporary world. Where did they come from? How did they arise? What can we do to counter them?

In this course we will first briefly examine the ancient and medieval historical contexts of Christian and Islamic religious antijudaism, out of which modern forms of antisemitism have arisen.

After that, we will spend most of our time analyzing precisely how movements in the twentieth and twenty-first centuries helped to spawn the notorious and vicious manifestations of antisemitism we are encountering today. In particular we will be studying: contemporary Islamic antisemitism; radical right-wing and radical left-wing hatred of Jews and Judaism; online antisemitism; antisemitism as a dogmatic truth among academics and on college campuses, and finally, the total denial of *any* sort of legitimacy to Zionism with a concomitant desire to eliminate the Jews in Israel, whether through forced expulsion or worse.

We will conclude by exploring some proposed strategies for responding to these newest forms of the oldest hatred.

**Dr. Jacob Meskin**, a favorite teacher at Kerem Shalom, is currently Academic Advisor and Senior Lecturer in the Me'ah Program at Hebrew College. Read a full bio <u>HERE</u>.





# Journeys of Transformation A Reading and Discussion Group




#### **KS Members in the Arts**

# **Torah Conversations Group**

KS Torah Conversations is an ongoing conversation group that meets each Shabbat morning. No prior knowledge of Torah or Hebrew is required to participate, although attendees are asked to read the week's parasha (Torah portion). Most participants read English translations. The parasha can be read

online at <u>Sefaria</u> as well as

Each year, the group chooses a collection of commentaries to read and use as a guide for discussion. For 5784, along with the parasha, the group will be reading and discussing the weekly section in <u>Talks on the Parasha</u> by Rabbi Adin Steinsaltz. Some participants also enjoy reading from a wide range of other commentaries, many of which are on our resource list.

Torah Conversations members take turns facilitating the discussion. The conversations typically flow back and forth between trying to understand the embedded meaning of the weekly parasha and connecting it to questions that have relevance in our lives. Each person's voice is welcomed.

Rabbi Sam Pollak, Director of Congregational Learning, serves as our Clergy Advisor. He will study with us and facilitate our conversations on the second Shabbat of the month in 2023-2024/5784.

The group meets each Shabbat morning, with rare exceptions, as long as there are two or more of us who are available to meet. Currently we meet on Zoom except for the last Saturday of the month when we meet in-person in the KS library. We begin our parasha discussion promptly at 8:45 AM and end at 9:45 AM. For more general conversation before and afterwards, the Zoom room is opened at about 8:35, and the library at about 8:30, and often extends for a few minutes after the closing prayer of Torah Conversations.



Are you interested in joining or starting a men's group? For over two decades, a small group of men connected with Kerem Shalom have been meeting regularly to witness each other's challenges, joys, and sorrows. Participants are happy to talk with



Kerem Shalom members who might be interested in joining this group or starting a new one.

When this group began, its members were in their late 40s, a challenging, heads-down life stage for many men. Members are now in their 60s and 70s, a life stage with new challenges related to work, health, relationships, and family. The group explores these themes in semi-structured, confidential, and non-judgmental conversations which are "advice-free unless asked." Work, children, partners, the man's "role" as caregiver, and adventures are all grist for this mill. And while this is not a religious study group, religious and spiritual experiences are sometimes discussed.

If there is sufficient interest, members of the current group are more than happy to help a new group get underway, then step back and let that group evolve.
