Behind the Scenes with a Leading Chef and Culinary Innovator: A Farm-to-Table Success Story

Ben Elliott will describe the challenges and satisfaction he derives from running Saltbox Enterprises, which are highly regarded for the fresh, farm-sourced food and beer produced right here in Concord.

Ben Elliott's culinary career includes more than 20 years as a professional chef at premier restaurants such as LaFolie and the Fifth Floor in San Francisco and Locke-Ober and No.9 Park in Boston. Ben left the fine dining scene to restore his family farm and work as a local chef for private clients. Soon after, Ben launched the Saltbox Farm CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) program, the Cooking School at Saltbox Farm, Catering by Saltbox, and opened Saltbox Kitchen as a neighborhood café and craft brewery in Concord.

Ben oversees every stage of the farm-to-table cycle, taking an active role in planting, harvesting, preparing, and serving his cuisine while leading his businesses. And what spectacular cuisine it is!

At this dinner Darlene will also demonstrate and enable guests to try out virtual reality, a tool she uses in her work. Darlene says, "Students learn best when they are getting their hands dirty in the field. Archaeology is truly experiential learning at its best."

The author of an award-winning book on the monastic landscape of late antique Egypt, Darlene tells us that "the past is made of fragments we may assemble to make a story". As both an archaeologist and historian, she has many fascinating stories to share.

Darlene is Myra and Robert Kraft and Jacob Hiatt Chair in Christian Studies and holds a joint appointment in the Department of Near Eastern and Judaic Studies and Classical Studies at Brandeis University.



Reimagining the Wizard of Oz: A Wicked Good Evening

Gregory Maguire is celebrated for his novel *Wicked: The Life and Times of the Wicked Witch of the West*. Since publication in 1995, *Wicked* has sold over 5 million copies, and inspired a hit Broadway musical and two popular movies.

The author of two dozen books, Gregory has long been a prominent figure in the world of children's literature. He helped found and co-direct Children's Literature New England, Inc., a nonprofit that raises awareness of the significance of literature in the lives of children. He has also served as Professor and Co-director of the Simmons College Center for the Study of Children's Literature.

You would be correct in expecting something special from the author of *Wicked*. In his own words, "I'll consider my experience in a life of reading and making stuff up and writing it down, and its effect on my life as a Concord citizen and neighbor that I have so relished. The blandishments of reading and writing fantasy, the costs and limitations as well as the rewards, may enter into it."

Escaping the Nazis: A Remarkable Story of Survival and Success

As a five-year-old, Lionel Fray and his mother fled Paris while the Nazis were marching toward the city. The pair narrowly escaped a roundup that would have sent them to a concentration camp. They experienced a series of "miracles" throughout occupied France and Casablanca, finally arriving in America. In 1942, Lionel and his mother were reunited with his father.

On their journey from Paris to America, Lionel and his mother encountered ordinary people who made extraordinary choices, risking everything to help a mother and her child. Their courage and humanity became the difference between life and death.

Fast forward 1942 until the present. Lionel has built an amazing career. Highlights include:

- Founding 4 start-ups (one went public).
- Serving as president of two companies that developed special methods to search for offshore oil and gas that were sold to industry leaders.
- Consulting to clients including Exxon, CBS, John Deere, GE and Intel.

Now in his 90s, Lionel continues to serve as a management consultant. Lionel has transcended the harrowing journey he took as a five-year-old child to become a remarkable American entrepreneur and business leader.



Traveling the World with the Tennis Elite: Insights from a Veteran Tournament Umpire

Have you ever wondered how someone becomes a tennis umpire? Mary Lou Tierney, a former professional tennis umpire, can tell you. Mary Lou served as a chair umpire in the US Open, Wimbledon, the French Open, the Barcelona Olympics and other international competitions and achieved significant milestones along the way. Highlights included chairing the women's final match at the US Open in 1991 overseeing players Monica Seles and Martina Navratilova and putting her name in the record books as the lone American official and only non-French woman to work the event.

Mary Lou's tennis journey began on Hilton Head Island, South Carolina in 1981 where she served as a volunteer official and ended in 1993 when the ITF decided to hire only men fulltime. She returned to college to complete her bachelor's and master's degrees and today works as a leadership development coach and expert in co-creating psychological safety on teams.

Mary Lou will share stories about her experiences including what it was like to serve as a tennis umpire, fascinating people she met along the way, the pressures of the business, and how the transition to fulltime, men-only referees unfolded and was handled.

- She ran a research center at Harvard's Kennedy School

The Next Chapter for Concord's Wright Tavern: Rekindling Civic Engagement

This iconic, nearly 300-year-old, red building in Concord Center holds a unique place in the history of Concord, of Massachusetts, and our nation. Now in the process of being transformed through restoration, preservation and renewal, it is on the way to becoming an inviting community gathering place and center for the exploration of democracy. Each room is dedicated to some aspect of Concord's history and offers stories and authentic décor that create a unique experience.

Tom Wilson leads this effort, heading the Wright Tavern Legacy Trust. A Concordian with a distinguished career in management consulting, business, and writing, Tom authored: *Concord's Wright Tavern: at the Crossroads of the American Revolution* and *The Next Stage: In Your Retirement, Create the Life You Want*.

Tom will show slides and share exciting and seldom told stories about the role of the Wright Tavern in the Revolutionary period and in the years that followed... some containing surprises about well-known historical figures. He'll also describe how a reimagined Wright Tavern can become a home for community dialogue and activity in the years ahead. Leading Wright Tavern's renewal enabled him to find new meaning and purpose in his own retirement.

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
